EDITORIAL

Avoiding the Comfort Zone

It is easy to become comfortable and complacent. You get a job. You work there for a few years. You get to know the people there and the routine.

You earn a few perks for being there for a while, such as a bit of additional vacation. It's easy to just settle in and ride.

You wake up to your financial situation. You make a bunch of moves to pay down debt and establish some new routines that aren't as costly. Eventually, you start to simply enjoy the lower bills and it all seems to come easily. You just settle in and ride.

Settling in is the easy thing to do. Usually, it's the path of least resistance, so unless you're consciously making other choices, you'll probably wind up doing just that.

The problem is that **"settling in and riding" is more dangerous than you think.** Settling in assumes that the thing that comes easy today will last forever.

If you're coasting in your career, you're just assuming that your current job will just last and last. You never see the job loss coming. If you're coasting with your finances, you're assuming your income will just last and last and that you'll just eventually take care of all of your debts and your goals. You never see the changes in your life coming.

On a more positive note, if you're just coasting with your career, you might never see opportunities for a great promotion at work or a new job opportunity that could put you in a great place. The same is true with finances – if you're just coasting, you might not be ready to take advantage of something when it comes along.

The challenge for all of us is to avoid falling into a comfort zone. But when the comfort zone is so easy to fall into, how do we avoid it?

How do we keep ourselves ready for change when there doesn't seem to be any change on the horizon?

One tactic is to **make preparing for change part of our ordinary life routine.** For example, part of your ordinary professional routine should be to keep your resume fresh through educational opportunities and taking on professional challenges in the workplace. Part of your ordinary financial routine should be improving your financial state month over month and seeking out new ways to ramp up the improvement. *This should be normal behavior.*

For me, I find it useful to spend some time each week looking at the various areas of my life – my professional goals, my finances, my marriage, my parenting responsibilities, my community responsibilities, my skills and passions, and so on – and ask myself what I'm doing to improve in those areas.

Another tactic I value is to **regularly envision disastrous scenarios.** What exactly happens in your life if you lose your job? What exactly happens in your life if your spouse falls ill? What exactly happens in your life if your health starts to slip?

Walk through those scenarios a little bit. What would you do? You'll quickly be able to find some steps that you could take *right now* to make that scenario go down smoother. Add those steps to your to-do list.

The key to both of these steps is to **add things to your to-do list that will lead you to better preparedness for opportunities and for disasters.** Riding in the comfort zone makes you complacent and poorly prepared for both disaster and opportunity. Every day, you have a chance to take little steps to make sure that you're ready for whatever comes your way. Don't be complacent. You'll miss out.

Specialization in Virtual Learning Environments

For the second year on a row, Centro de Formación Pedagógica y Tecnología Educativa (CFPTE) organized a conference on: Specialization in Virtual Learning Environments. The conference was in charge of Virtual Educa Director Jorge Rey Valzacchi. Elections in Costa Rica

Last Costa Rican elections surprised voters. PAC's Luis Guillermo Solís overtook PLN's Johnny Araya by less than 2% of the total votes.

Solís said that, if he wins, his administration would focus on cleaning up corruption in the government to restore voter confidence, while getting the country's public works infrastructure back up and running. The PAC candidate has never held elected political office but is no stranger to the halls of power, working in several PLN administrations and serving as ambassador to Panama during the administration of José María Figueres (1994-1998), before leaving the party for the PAC. With 9 percent counted by the Supreme Elections Tribunal at 8:30 p.m., the ruling PLN candidate Johnny Araya had what seemed a commanding lead at 36.24 percent, followed by Citizen Action Party candidate Luis Guillermo Solís, with 22.8 percent. But as the night wore on, the flags started to fall limp and the music got louder as organizers tried to buoy their supporters' spirits as Araya's lead fell and Solís' rose. Araya continued the air travel metaphor: *"Today's outcome has not caused any turbulence in my heart or mind."*



Because of this surprising outcome, center-left presidential candidate Luis Guillermo Solís will battle ruling party candidate Johnny Araya in a runoff on April 6th.

Costa Rica's elections, which were peaceful, showed a growing polarization among progressive and conservative voters.

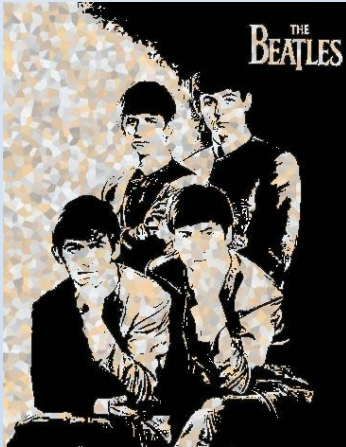
The next president, who will take office May 8th, will need to be a strong negotiator to face a divided Assembly. The voter abstention rate on February 4th election hovered between 32-34 percent of 3.1 million voters, consistent with the previous two presidential elections.





50 Years of Beatlemania

On February 7, 1964, The Beatles arrived at New York's John F. Kennedy Airport, greeted by scores of screaming, swooning fans who rushed the gate to catch a glimpse of John Lennon, Paul McCartney, George Harrison and Ringo Starr as they took their first steps on American soil. Two nights later, on Sunday, February 9, 74 million viewers in the U.S. and millions more in Canada tuned in to CBS to watch The Beatles make their American television debut on "The Ed Sullivan Show." The excitement of The Beatles' February 7 arrival in New York, where they were met by an estimated 3,000 ecstatic fans at the airport, was documented by the world's leading media

outlets, beamed around the world in a blitz of news bulletins and photos. Every move The Beatles made, and seemingly every word they uttered, was captured – melting hearts of young fans everywhere who simply could not get enough of these charming, witty and stylish British boys and their electrifying new songs.

There was only one place on earth I wanted to be on February 7th, 1964, and that was at New York City's newly re-dedicated John F. Kennedy Airport. The announcement that four mop headed lads from Liverpool, England were coming to the United States for their first concert tour, sent shock waves throughout the baby boomer community. Several magazine writers published critical observations of The Beatles personal appearance and their performance, among them was Newsweek reporter Richard Lemon.



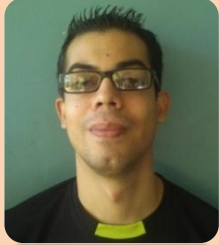
He wrote a scathing article calling them, "mop heads" and said they had no talent and predicted, "the odds are that they will fade away, as most adults confidently predict."

A World beyond Dreams: The Faces behind the Super Heroes

This is the world of the most famous and incredible super heroes of all times, where anything can happen, they belong to the most important

comic company on earth: Marvel comics and DC Comics. They have transformed the way we read comic books, because they have created different worlds and characters that have caught the attention of people around the world; however, not everybody knows the story behind each company, or how each character and the plot were created?

Stan Lee is considered the father of Marvel Comics, but at the beginning he was just a handy man working for a small newspaper in New York; however, from 1961 to 1969, he came up with a bunch of heroes that saved the comic business. Since Marvel Comics was established in 1961, many different heroes with incredible super powers have become the idols of millions around the planet. In 1962, for example, Stan Lee created Spider-man, best known as Peter Parker. Spider-Man was the super hero who saved Marvel Comics when it was in

a very difficult economical situation, because comics were not sold due people finding the stories boring and predictable.

Spider Man was inspired in Lee's own life as a teenager. He wanted a character with normal problems like any 19 year old during the 50s. One day when Stan Lee saw a fly walking on the wall and the idea of a man with the powers of an insect was born. Stan Lee first tried with different insects, but he ended up choosing the spider. Then, the red costume with black spider webs was invented. Spider-man's weakness is his own personality; he had to deal against his own way to control his powers and how to use them. It is believed that Spider-Man is so popular because of these human traits and vulnerability.

On the other hand, another important character created by Marvel Comics was Hulk. Hulk came to life in 1962, when the atomic war was about to begin, so Stan Lee based his character on that, but and also he wanted to add some aspects from his favorite monsters like Frankenstein and doctor Jekyll and Mr. Hyde. Hulk had two personalities, one was normal and the other one was not easy to control. Hulk did not have a

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great costume, when he turned into Hulk his skin changes its color to a deep green and his pants are the only clothes he keeps after transformation. Hulk is powerful but his weakness is his explosive personality.

In general, the places where heroes live are most of the time unreal worlds or cities and Stan Lee decided to change that. He wanted his heroes to have connection with people, so he did not create fantasy cities, instead, he wanted his characters to live in well-known cities like New York or Los Angeles; besides, and he wanted his heroes to travel around the world. For example, Peter Parker lives in New York, he has to face the reality of paying the rent of his apartment, because it does not matter if he is Spiderman, he has to pay it, and if he does not have a job he has to go like any other human and find a new job; besides, he has to escape from the police, because not everybody thinks that he is a hero. Hulk, on the other hand, has to face that each time that he becomes Hulk, he is totally aware that he is going to destroy the city, so he has to tackle with that reality. Marvel Comics is a world of amazing super heroes that can make us dream, but it is not the only one, DC comics has also created a bunch of heroes to compete with Marvel.

DC comics has become the perfect competition for Marvel, but DC

Comics is older than Marvel. DC comics was founded in the year 1934 by Malcolm Wheeler Nicholson; however, at the beginning the name was not DC comic, it was DETECTIVE COMIC BOOKS, and the stories that the company wrote in that period was basically about detective mysteries, love stories and aliens. Soon after, the stories became boring and the sales went down, so the company had to make a change; for that reason, the company tried to create different heroes in an attempt to save the company. In 1938 an unknown artist called Jerry Siegel, came up with the idea of one Superman that had the ability to fly, and that also had great strength; so Superman was created in the perfect moment to save the company.

Jerry Siegel created Superman. He based his character in different moments and aspects of his own life; for example, when he was a child he lost his father in a car accident, so he wanted to create someone invincible; in addition, his story was also inspired by Robin Hood. Because the country was going through a very difficult situation, he wanted to create a symbol of freedom and justice. The personality of Superman was inspired in movies from the 20s; for that reason, the name Clark Kent was the union of two famous actors Clark Gable and Kent Taylor. Then, Superman costume's was a cape, a

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pair of boots and no mask, and the colors was red, blue and yellow, but the costume has changed through time. Then, in 1939, The Batman was born. Bob Kane and Bill Finger were his creators. The Batman was inspired in detective novels and his costume at the beginning was a pair of boots, two wings and no mask; the colors were red and black; however, before they drew the final version, Finger came up with the idea of gloves, a cape simulating bat wings, and a mask. He also decided to eliminate the red color. Batman has no powers, but his intelligence, strength and technology are enough to defeat the criminals.

DC Comics authors did not want to put their characters in known places, so they created new places. The city of Metropolis, where Superman lives, was inspired in a movie from 1922; then, the character of Superman was created to be the savior of Metropolis. Superman cannot kill or take advantage of his power, because Siegel based part of his personality in characters from the Bible like Moses and Angel Gabriel because he can fly, and he is a symbol of God.

On the other hand, Kane and Finger created the unreal city of Gotham because it was a reflection of Batman dark and mysterious life; moreover,

Gotham city tried to follow the classic detective comics with dark halls that helped Batman to hide easily at night. Batman should undergo a difficult training to become Batman, and that's why his personality is as that of a cold fish. One more aspect is that he had to learn how to stop his thirst for revenge because his parents were killed when he was just a child. Stan Lee and Kane brought to life great characters and also developed the plot, costume, background and the personality of their heroes; nevertheless, they never imagined that their heroes would be the idols of millions of people around the world. These are just some examples of super heroes that DC and Marvel have created, but there are no limits, the world of super heroes will grow every day, because all of us are heroes, maybe not with cape or power, but with intelligence and love.

Second Language Acquisition

There are many theories and different points of view regarding second language acquisition.

Neither of the theories or approaches proposed in this matter can be totally discarded. There are quite interesting facts in almost all of them which can give us some answers to how students acquire English as a foreign language (EFL).

In the case of Universal Grammar, this theory suggests that grammar or linguistics does not need to be taught to children when their first language (L1) is being acquired. Children have an already existing system of linguistic knowledge that they use when learning their native language. The question that arises is whether or not individuals still have this innate ability when acquiring a second language (L2) as adults.

It is my opinion that this innate ability is never lost in older learners. What happens is that there is now interference from L1 to L2. This interference or transfer can be positive or negative. "When L1 and L2 parameter settings for the same principle are the same, positive transfer from L1 to L2 is likely; when L1

and L2 parameter settings are different, negative transfer or interference might occur." (Saville-Troike, 2012) For instance, there are many words that are written the same or are very similar in English and in Spanish (assist, asistir, economic, económico, etc.), but many of them do not have the same meaning once they are translated. It happens quite often with our students that they use lexicon incorrectly because of language transfer. If they do not internalize the difference in cases like these, then that negative transfer can lead to fossilization. In the case of positive transfer, I can mention the example of plural forms. In both English and in Spanish, most words are pluralized by just adding a final -s to them.

Opposed to the Universal Grammar approach proposed by Chomsky, there are some functional approaches that although different in some aspects share some common characteristics. The focus of these approaches is on performance and competence. Language is seen as a system of communication and not as a set of rules.

I like the idea of regarding language as a system of communication where rules exist but are not the most

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important part of it. Many times, students get frustrated when learning English because they do not see any advance or progress in the learning process. If they could get to master some basic functions of the language and then from there create or develop new meaning for practical usage, they would be more successful at acquiring an additional language.

The social context, as the systemic linguistics approach suggests, should

be taken into account in the acquisition of a second language. I have noticed that when my students see some purpose or connection with what they are learning and their own needs, they appear to be more enthusiastic at using the language. Even though the different theories and approaches seem to give good explanations and examples to clarify why the ability to acquire and use language in L1 is easier and faster than acquiring a L2, or why some learners are more efficient than others when acquiring the same L2, more extensive research has to be done in regards to this subject matter.

Costa Rican Educational Policies

Costa Rica's political system values education as an important way of reducing the gap between classes.

Education creates new opportunities for social advancement, and it is therefore considered the basis of democracy. Costa Ricans are proud of their educational system, and our laws state that Costa Rican education is obligatory for primary school students; the government has the responsibility to regulate all educational levels from preschool to university. It is evident the intention of our nation is to look out for our students' needs. In this regard, great efforts have been done to sign agreements that reinforce our education, especially in rural areas where conditions and resources are not the optimum. Thus, to improve the education in our country, The Superior Council of Education approved in 1994 "The Educational Politics towards the XXI Century" which states that: *"our educational system has the purpose of achieving an integral improvement for the learner, based on principles of equality and equity"*. (Ministry of Education, p. 18). It is also based on some philosophical sources

where constructivism and humanism are the most relevant ones.

The principles of humanism and constructivism are essential in the teaching and learning process. The humanism refers to the fact that the educational process must analyze the individual's demands. This should take into consideration not only the resources such as material and technology, but also the student's cognitive needs. Students deserve to be respected and considered as unique individuals with specific necessities. Professionals in education have to be capable and willing to handle different learning styles in the classes and give students the specific strategies they need to learn. Furthermore, humanism is a paradigm that promotes collectivity. Since early ages, students should learn how to interact with others, learn from others and respect other's opinions; in that way, they will develop the competences to live in society, looking for the individual and collective welfare. On the other hand, constructivism takes into consideration the individuality and interests of the learner. The student performs an active role and the teacher is a guide in the teaching and learning process (Salgado, 2006).

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In this holistic paradigm, the tasks are presented authentically, taking into account the context where the student is immersed. The teachers need to develop students' thinking and knowledge by using a variety of strategies that emphasize problem solving and critical thinking. These are relevant techniques in the construction of the knowledge that should also be considered in the process.

Costa Rica is proud of its educational system, and our constitution guarantees the conditions to develop

an integral paradigm. "The Educational Politics towards the XXI Century" describes the ideal educational system our institutions must develop. However, the government is not the only responsible party for taking care of the process and identifying the students' needs. All the actors in the educational community must work to have a system based on equality and equity. A system that promotes self-learning and independence recognizing individuality must be implemented. Only in that way, we will have better professionals and definitely better citizens in our country.

From the Screen to the Page

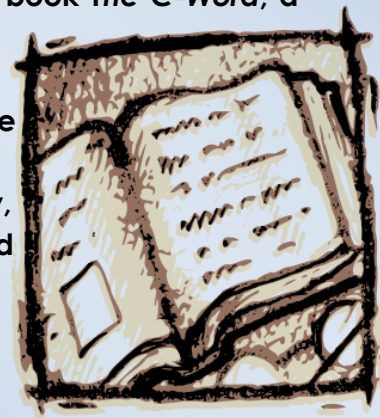

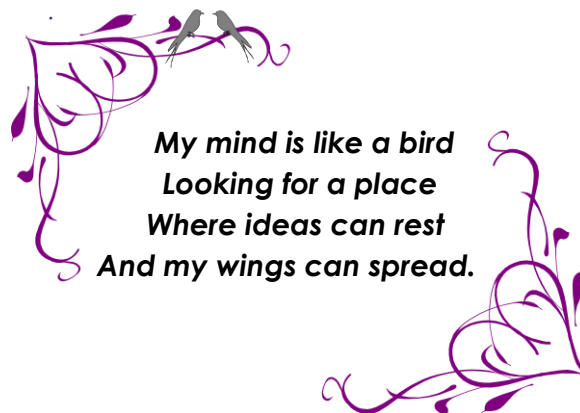

What is a paradox?

A paradox is a statement that apparently contradicts itself and yet might be true.[1][2] Most logical paradoxes are known to be invalid arguments but are still valuable in promoting critical thinking. Some paradoxes have revealed errors in definitions assumed to be rigorous, and have caused axioms of mathematics and logic to be re-examined.

Common themes in paradoxes include self-reference, infinite regress, circular definitions, and confusion between different levels of abstraction. Some example of famous paradoxes are:

"War is peace."
"Freedom is slavery."
"Ignorance is strength."

Valentine's Day

People have celebrated Valentine's Day on February 14th for centuries. It is especially popular in England, France, Canada, and the United States. St. Valentine's Day began as a liturgical celebration of one or more early Christian saints named Valentinus. Several martyrdom stories were invented for the various Valentines that belonged to February 14, and added to later martyrologies. A popular hagiographical account of Saint Valentine of Rome states that he was imprisoned for performing weddings for soldiers who were forbidden to marry and for ministering to Christians, who were persecuted under the Roman Empire. According to legend, during his imprisonment, he healed the daughter of his jailer, Asterius. An embellishment to this story states that before his execution he wrote her a letter signed "Your Valentine" as a farewell.

The day was first associated with romantic love in the circle of Geoffrey Chaucer in the High Middle Ages, when the tradition of courtly love flourished. In 18th-century England, it evolved into an occasion in which lovers expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, offering confectionery, and sending greeting cards (known as "valentines"). Valentine's Day symbols that are used today include the heart-shaped outline, doves, and the figure of the winged Cupid. Since the 19th century, handwritten valentines have given way to mass-produced greeting cards.

Many superstitions surround the day. Some people think that the first person you see on this day will be your valentine. It is good luck to be awakened by a kiss. It is also thought that if you dream of someone the night before Valentine's Day, that person will be your sweetheart.

In Slovenia, Saint Valentine or Zdravko was one of the saints of spring, the saint of good health and the patron of beekeepers and pilgrims. A proverb says that "Saint Valentine brings the keys of roots". Plants and flowers start to grow on this day. It has been celebrated as the day when the first work in the vineyards and in the fields commences.
